
AMA 11th ed. Guidelines

Title Page

- In the center of the page, provide the title of your paper, student's name, and the name of the University
- The abstract should go right after the title page information

Example:

Health Disparities within the United States
John Appleseed
The University of North Carolina at Pembroke

Abstract

Blah Blah Blah

In-text citations

- Within the text, you will not provide the author's full last name or publication years right after the authors which would be seen in APA or ASA formats.
- You will provide a numerical subscript that comes after periods or commas. These numbers will coincide with the numbers provided on the reference page.
- Each source should be listed numerically in the order it was referenced in the text in the reference list at the conclusion of your work. (alphabetization is not necessary)
- If you want to cite multiple citations, separate the subscripts by commas
- If you need to cite the same source multiple times, you will reuse the subscript number.

- a. Journal articles
-

Author AA, Author BB, Author CC. Title of article: lower case letter for subtitle. *Abbreviated Title of Journal*. Year;Volume number(Issue number):page numbers. Date published. Date accessed [these are for URLs]. DOI or URL (no period at the end)

- One will abbreviate names of the journal (especially when using PubMed)
- If you cannot find the abbreviation, use NCBI's finder:
<https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/nlmcatalog/journals/> and look within the records
- The doi is preferred, however, use the url if the doi is not found

b. Basic Book format

Author AA, Author BB, Author CC. Title of Book: Subtitle of Book. Edition. Name of publisher; Year of publication.
