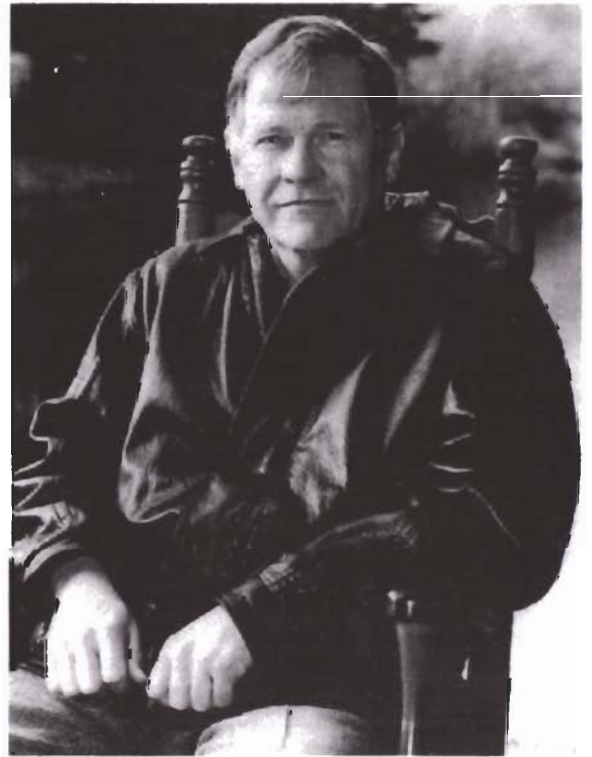

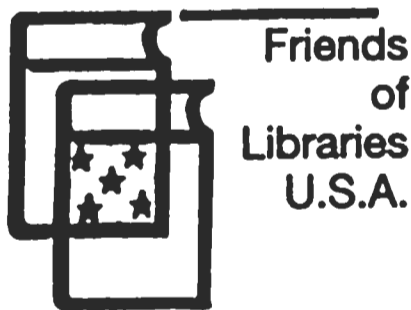

## Benefit Featuring Robert Morgan Kicks Off Month-Long Celebration @ Your Library

"Get Caught Reading @ Your Library" is this year's theme for National Library Week, April 14-20, 2002. The Sampson-Livermore Library chose this theme and has planned activities for nearly a month. Join your library in this celebration of libraries, reading, writing, and information.

The celebration begins with "An Evening with Robert Morgan" on March 22, 2002. This Friday night benefit features Mr. Morgan speaking about his novel *Gap Creek*, an Oprah Book Club selection and Southern Book Award winner. [For more about the author, see the related article.] The evening begins at 6:00 p.m. with a reception and the opening of the silent auction. Background music during the reception and auction will be provided by UNCP's flute ensemble directed by June Infantino. The buffet dinner starts at 7:30 p.m., with Dr. Morgan's discussion of his work following. Mr. Morgan has agreed to autograph books. Donations are currently being received for the silent auction, with some very nice packages already promised. Tickets for the benefit are \$50 per person with all proceeds going to support projects of the Friends of the Library of The University of North Carolina at Pembroke. Come out and meet the author, hear him speak, and bid on some of our wonderful silent bid items. Tickets are limited to only 100, so please make your reservations early. Perhaps you've been caught reading one (or more) of your library books for a bit too long. Fine Free Week runs the entire week of April 14-20. Any book checked out from the Sampson-Livermore Library, no matter how long you've been reading it, may be returned without fines being charged. If you're wondering if you have any overdue books, you can check your circulation record from the library's Web site <http://www.uncp.edu/library>. Fine Free Week not only helps clear your library record, but also helps the library avoid replacing materials that may be costly or out of print. It also allows your tax dollars to be spent on new resources for the Library. So go out and explore the places you may have been reading and return those books to us.

Perhaps you need some new materials to be caught reading. Find them at the Library Book Sale, beginning on Monday, April 15, from 9:00 a.m.-7:00 p.m., with this first day only open to Friends of the Library. Primarily, there will be books and magazines for sale on the first floor of the Library. As usual, there will be some bid items. On Tuesday, the sale opens to the general public at 9:00 a.m. and closes at 7:00 p.m. From Wednesday to Friday, the hours are 9:00 a.m. through 5:00 p.m. Prices this year are \$1.00 for hardbacks, \$0.50 for paperbacks, and \$0.25 for magazines. Come early for the best selection. If you care to donate materials you no longer need, bring them to the Library. If they complement our collection, we'll add them to it. If not, they will be sold at the book sale to benefit the Friends of the Library. These materials are just looking for someone to take them home, read them, and add them to a home library.

On Wednesday, April 17, we will have a reading of award winning works from the Poetry/Short Prose Contest. The con-

test was open to UNCP students, UNCP faculty/staff, area high school students, and the general public and members of the Friends of Sampson-Livermore Library. [See the previous issue of the newsletter for full details about the contest.] The three winners in each of the four categories will be invited to read the pieces selected by the contest judges as winners. The reading will take place in the Library this year, in the main reading room at 3:30 p.m. Campus authors will also be honored during the program. A reception honoring campus authors will follow in the leisure reading area [see related article]. Come and enjoy the literary creativity of these talented writers, who will be caught reading their works. A display of selected works by campus authors will be in the Library as well as a bibliography of all works submitted as published.

### Robert Morgan to Be Guest of Honor at Benefit

Robert Morgan is the featured speaker at a benefit for the Friends of the Library of UNCP on March 22 [see related article]. A North Carolina native of Hendersonville, Morgan is an award-winning poet and novelist.

Born in 1944, Morgan grew up on land settled by Welsh farmers. He studied at Emory College in Oxford, Georgia, and at North Carolina State University before attending The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, earning his Bachelor's degree in 1965. He continued his education at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, earning his Master's degree. Morgan is currently a professor of English at Cornell University.

*Gap Creek* (1999) is the novel that captured the interest of Oprah Winfrey, who added it to the Oprah Book Club list in January 2000. Praised for the accuracy of detail in depicting the southern Appalachian region, Morgan reflects the cadences of speech and the daily life of the area. His description of pig slaughtering is widely praised. This novel also received critical acclaim, winning the Southern Book Award for fiction, awarded by the Southern Book Critics Circle.

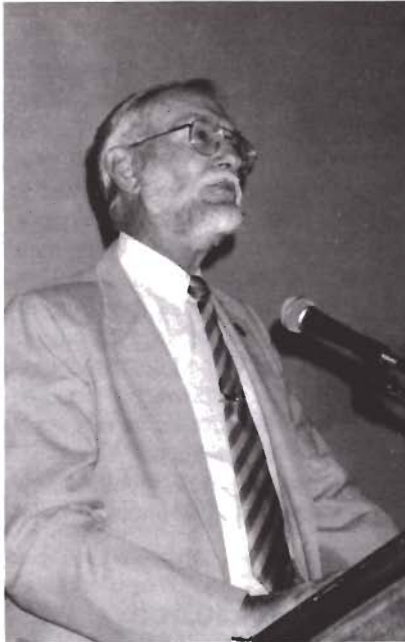
*The Truest Pleasure* (1995) was also praised for the author's use of language and his accuracy in character portrayal. The book takes place in the North Carolina mountains, but the story it tells is universal. A Publisher's Weekly Best Book of the Year, it was also a finalist for the Southern Book Award.

*This Rock* (2001) continues the story of the Powell family told in *The Truest Pleasure*. The Richards family from *Gap Creek* also appears in a supportive role. Taking place in the North Carolina mountains, it is filled with realistic characters and descriptions. This story with its roots in the biblical story of Cain and Abel has won praise from many reviewers.

Robert Morgan is also a noted poet, essayist, and short story writer, with his works winning a generous amount of critical acclaim. His love of the Appalachians is reflected in his writing.

The three novels mentioned above are available in the Sampson-Livermore Library. Tickets (\$50) to the benefit on March 22, 2002, are limited to 100, so please make reservations early. We know that you will enjoy hearing Robert Morgan speak.

# Authors Honored During National Library Week



Authors of winning entries in the National Library Week Poetry/Short Prose Contest, as well as campus authors, will be honored at a reception following the public reading of the winning entries Wednesday, April 17. The reading program will take place beginning at 3:30 in the main reading room of the Library and the reception will follow in the leisure reading area of the Sampson-Livermore Library.

Campus authors who have had books, articles, or poetry published within the past year will be honored at the reception. Among the honorees will be **Dr. Raymond J. Rundus**, Professor Emeritus of English and Vice President/President-Elect of the Friends of the Library of UNCP, whose book *Joseph Mitchell: Pilgrim in Manhattan*, has recently been published by Xlibris. Dr. Rundus's book will be available for purchase and signing by the author at the reception. Other campus authors will be invited to make their books available at the reception also.

## Cell Phones in The Sampson-Livermore Library

Beethoven, The Dukes of Hazard, weird space noises. At first glance this might appear to be an odd list. However, each of these happens to be a popular "ring" on cell phones. Although these unique rings are entertaining, they can also be quite distracting.

We at the Sampson-Livermore Library like to think of ourselves as a relaxed group of people, far from the stuffy stereotype that often is associated with library personnel, but, at the same time, we are traditionalists and feel that the Library should be a quiet place to read and study. In order to maintain a quiet environment for studying and reading, we have recently established a policy on cell phone use in the Library. The policy reads:

*Cell phone use is limited to the library entryway. Ringers should be turned off upon entering the Library. Thanks for your assistance with noise level containment.*

Signs displaying the policy are located throughout the Library, and the staff is making an effort to inform patrons of the policy verbally. A system-wide e-mail message detailing the policy was sent to all UNCP faculty members and staff members, and hopefully the information was passed along to students.

We certainly hope that people feel relaxed when in the Library, but we also want individual patrons to realize that they are not the only ones using the facility and its resources. Maintaining a quiet environment is everyone's job. A little common courtesy goes a long way.

# Library Heralds New & Enhanced Electronic Resources

It seems like everywhere we look, turn, stand, and sit, we are faced with technology. The reason for this is simple, according to Alvin Toffler, twentieth-century writer and author of *Future Shock*. Toffler states in *Future Shock*, "Technology feeds on itself. Technology makes more technology possible."

The Sampson-Livermore Library is pleased to offer several new and enhanced electronic learning resources, which will provide quality reference and educational support service to our constituents. The best part is that all this valuable information is available from the library's Web site, <http://www.uncp.edu/library>.

## **JSTOR Arts & Sciences II Collection:**

In addition to the already 100+ image scanned full-text journals accessible from *JSTOR* (Journal STORage), the *Arts & Sciences II Collection* provides access to a multi-disciplinary collection containing journals and disciplines which enhance those in the *Arts & Sciences I Collection*. By the end of December 2002, the *A&S II Collection* will include at least 100 new journal titles, covering a wide range of topics, such as African and Slavic Studies and Statistics. Please note that *JSTOR* covers journal titles between the recently published issue and the most current issue available in *JSTOR*. This gap is usually 2-5 years.

## **Historical Abstracts and America: History and Life now provide full-text**

In January of this year, ABC-CLIO, the provider of *Historical Abstracts* and *America: History and Life*, excellent research tools for students, scholars, and historians, linked these databases to the History Cooperative Web site. These databases will include full-text links to journals in the *JSTOR Arts & Sciences I* and *Arts & Sciences II Collections* which match ABC-CLIO coverage. Users of these resources can now search journals like the *William and Mary Quarterly*, *American Historical Review* or *Journal of American History* and be linked to the full-text content. Please note that *JSTOR* covers journal titles between the recently published issue and the most current issue available in *JSTOR*. This gap is usually 2-5 years.

## **North American Women's Letters and Diaries (NCLIVE):**

The brain child of Stephen Rhind-Tutt, President of Alexander Street Press, *North American Women's Letters and Diaries* (NAWLD) includes information pertaining to the experiences of 442 women, revealed in approximately 50,000 pages of diaries and letters. By summer 2002, this database will become the largest full-text collection of diaries, journals, and letters written by women visiting or living in North America.

Researchers will benefit from the 150,000 pages of primary published letters and personal diaries from Colonial times to 1950. This resource provides excellent indexing and allows for simple word or date searches. Advanced features allow limiting by age, marital status, age at marriage, number of children, race, occupation, religion, and much more.

## **MERLOT (Multimedia Education Resources for Learning and Online Teaching):**

Created by the California State University Center for Distributed Learning in 1997, *MERLOT*, a free resource, was designed for faculty and students in academia. *MERLOT*, which has an international audience, strives to enrich the teaching and learning experiences of the over 1,400 campuses, 350,000 faculty and 8 million students it serves. Faculty and students will benefit from the thousands of links to learning materials, sample assignments, a broad area of disciplines covered, and a plethora of other valuable information. ## **NCLIVE's Subject and Full-Text Journal Title Lists:**

EBSCO, one of the leading providers in electronic serials and resources, has created a very detailed but comprehensive subject list, which currently covers its *Academic Search Elite* and *Business Source Elite* databases. This information has been arranged into various subject classifications and provides a brief description of topics covering that classification. EBSCO plans to provide a subject list for its *MasterFILE Premier* and *MAS Ultra - School Edition* on or before April 2002. Visit <http://www.epnet.com/maglists/maglist.com>, to access the currently available subject lists. In addition to the subject lists, users can now view a listing of full-text journals made available by the various information providers within *NC LIVE* by visiting <http://www.nclive.org/libnsrc.shtml#titlelists>.
