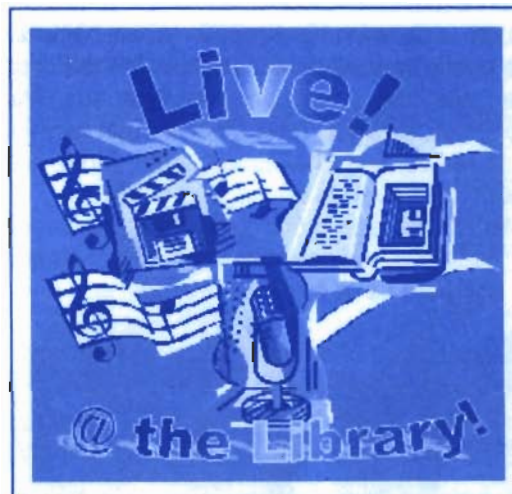

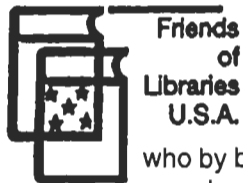

Message from the President

HAD WE BUT WORLD ENOUGH AND TIME

During the Renaissance as well as in the British Restoration, time was regarded as a destroyer. To Dryden in "Mac Flecknoe": "All human things human are subject to decay/And, when fate summons, monarchs must obey." To later poets, in a powerful cosmic irony, it could also become a healer. Andrew Marvel, in "To His Coy Mistress": "Had we but world enough, and time,/This coyness, lady, were no crime./But at my back I always hear/Time's winged chariot hurrying near." Yet in the poetic imaginations of writers of the Elizabethan age, it was also hoped that love could transcend the limitations of flesh and worldly goods: Shakespeare, in his Sonnet 116, regarded love as "an ever-fixed mark" and not "Time's fool, though rosy lips and cheeks/Within his bending sickle's compass come." Both Marvel and Shakespeare, of course, are speaking of human sexual love, of two



who by becoming one can "bear it out even to the edge of doom."

In spite of a fifty per cent divorce rate in our culture and the banality of lust in such TV programs as "Joe Millionaire," "The Bachelorette," "Temptation Island," and barfeam, most young people today probably still have a deep down, exhilarating anticipation that somewhere out there he or she will meet their one and only. There is comfort in this. (Also, in a successful quest, some good luck.)

In our age, when time can be measured in scope from microseconds to a span of thousands of light years, when Albert Einstein has propounded a stunning theory of the relationship of time and space, and when a great physicist can offer a "Brief History" of it, it might seem that at last we have corralled that elusive rascal, brought him to bay in the limbs of the Tree of Knowledge. And yet, to me and my fellow mortals on Spaceship Earth, such astounding achievements have brought more anxiety than comfort. The conflict of science and faith, which erupted after 1859 with the publication of *The Origin of Species*, has not been resolved; and disputes about that conflict continue to emerge. Once again, we may be forced to agree with Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who following Dostoevsky, said in his undelivered 1970 Nobel Prize address, "Beauty may yet save the world." Solzhenitsyn meant that the understanding and appreciation of art, maybe especially literary art, could prevail at times when truth and goodness (the other parts of the Socratic Ancient Trinity) are thwarted or perverted. That hope lies in the sentiment expressed in John Keats's *Endymion*,

A thing of beauty is a joy forever;
Its loveliness increases; it will never
Pass into nothingness...

Let us keep such values in mind as we approach "National Library Week." *Carpe diem!*

Featured will be the UNCP brass ensemble during the reception, an auction, a bountiful buffet presented in a festively decorated dining room, and a delightful lineup of entertainment. The brass group will be directed by **Tim Altman** of the UNCP Department of Music. Entertainers include **Bland Simpson**, Director of the Creative Writing Program at UNC Chapel Hill; **Dr. Roger Brown**, UNCP Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs; **Dr. Nick Giannatasio**, Chair and Director of the Master of Public Administration Program at UNCP, and **Tim Van Hooser**, Sampson-Livermore Library, Technical Reference Assistant.

Bland Simpson is author of several books, the latest of which is *Ghost Ship of Diamond Shoals: The Mystery of the Carroll A. Deering*. During his performance he will tell tales, play the piano, sing ballads, and in the process provide great entertainment. Mr. Simpson is a UNC graduate.

Dr. Roger Brown and **Dr. Nick Giannatasio** both have impressive academic credentials and day jobs as academic administrators at UNCP. But on the side and in their spare time, can they harmonize! Benefit attendees will have a rare treat when the Brown/Giannatasio duo takes the stage.

Tim Van Hooser performed professionally for years as a vocalist and keyboard artist before deciding to take up a second career in libraries. He continues to perform locally in clubs and restaurants and for civic groups and charitable organizations (such as the UNCP Friends of the Library) as time permits.

The auction will provide opportunities for ticket holders to take home some unique and valuable items. A featured offering is a large cathedral pane quilt hand pieced and stitched by **Mrs. Margaret Ray Folger**, mother of University Librarian **Elinor Foster**. Also offered will be other needlework; pieces of art that include a Chinese screen and work by UNCP faculty; pottery; jewelry; gift certificates and baskets; golf packages and other athletic interest items; plants, clothing; children's parties; dinners, two Southwest Airline tickets and more.

The "Live! @ the Library!" benefit, which kicks off National Library Week, should be a memorable evening and will support projects of the Friends of the Library such as preservation of special collection items and establishment of a scholarship. Media Donations to the Sampson-Livermore Library

The Sampson-Livermore Library is excited about expanding its media collection. Part of the Library's long-range planning goal is to increase its holdings in various media formats. We are continuing to purchase more titles with our allocated budget funds. However, with the help of the Student Government Association (SGA) at University of North Carolina at Pembroke, and other library supporters, our goal will be met sooner. Numerous donations of videos, CDs, audio tapes including books-on-tape, and other media have spurred the growth of our media collection.



As a result of the SGA Movie Library project, the Sampson-Livermore Library just received \$500.00 worth of DVD and VHS titles. Furthermore, this is not a one-time donation. The SGA has appropriated the same amount each year to make this an ongoing project. According to SGA Junior Senator Paul Parker, "Titles are both current and classic. They range from action-packed to a little bit of everything. The titles are tasteful and rated general audience to restricted." Critical Mass, a committee from the SGA, with the help of James Bass, Assistant Director of Student Activities, selects and purchases the movies, then the movies are brought to the Library. Parker stated, "Critical Mass is accepting donations from anybody. However, the committee reserves the right to evaluate and approve any donation. The rating must be between general audience and restricted." He also wanted to thank everyone who worked so hard on the Movie Library project. Plans are being formulated for a dedication ceremony at the Sampson-Livermore Library having representatives from WNCP and *The Pine Needle* present, with a reception following. The new movies are being processed in order to have the collection ready for check out at this dedication ceremony. The date and time will be announced later.



We have also seen an increase in video donations by other library supporters. During the past year we have received numerous CDs. We are also pleased to receive books-on-tape. If you have a distance to drive, listening to these tapes is a pleasant way to pass the time.

Media is available for UNCP students, faculty, and staff to check out. Due to licensing and copyright restrictions, the general public may not check out these materials. Sampson-Livermore Library Receives First Edition Books

The Sampson-Livermore Library received on long-term loan from the Robeson County Public Library a collection of signed, first edition books written by Robeson County native and writer for *The New Yorker*, Joseph Mitchell. On December 20, 2002, Dr. Elinor Foster, University Librarian; Lillian Brewington, Special Collections Librarian; Dr. Bill Gash, Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Raymond Rundus, retired UNCP professor and President of the Friends of the Library, met with Robeson County Library Director, Robert Fisher, to receive the ten books valued at several thousand dollars.

Mr. Mitchell was born on a tobacco farm in Fairmont in 1908. He went to New York City in 1929 when he was twenty-one years old. He wrote for *The World*, *The Herald Tribune*, and *The World-Telegram* for eight years before beginning his career for *The New Yorker*, where he spent the next fifty-eight years. Mr. Mitchell kept his ties to Fairmont where he owned a farm and where he still has relatives in residence.

Mr. Mitchell's collection of books will be housed in the Special Collections area of the Sampson-Livermore Library, where they will be safe-guarded for research and reading.

Sampson-Livermore Library Introduces New Electronic Resources

The Sampson-Livermore Library staff is pleased to announce the availability of several new electronic resources. To access these sites, users are encouraged to visit the library's homepage at <http://uncp.edu/library>.

Accessible Archives

This electronic resource allows library users to have access to full-text information from periodicals dating from the 18th and 19th centuries. Examples of newspapers and magazines to be found on this site include *Godey's Lady's Book, 1830-1880*, and *The Civil War: A Newspaper Perspective*.

CINAHL (full text)

CINAHL or the *Cumulative Index to Allied Health Literature* is now available through OCLC FirstSearch as well as EBCSOhost. This database enables users to gain access to approximately 1200 journals covering the nursing profession. Other coverage areas include consumer health and the biomedical field. *CINAHL* indexes journals, dissertations, conferences, etc.

Contemporary Women's Issues

This database, available through OCLC Firstsearch, enables users to view full-text articles on a variety of topics affecting women from over 150 countries around the world. Possible topics for searching include feminism and civil rights. *CWI* provides access to or indexes books, journals, newsletters and more. Options for e-mailing or printing the documents are available.

Documenting the American South

As the title suggests, this resource created by the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill provides access to material on the American South. Information covers a broad time frame from colonial times to the first part of the 20th century. Sample resources to be located here include personal narratives and the experiences of North Carolina residents in World War II.

Eric Document Reproduction Service (EDRS)

The *Eric Document Reproduction Services* (also know as EDRS) provides delivery of Eric documents directly to users. Records may be searched on this site by specific Eric document (ED) number if known. Examples of materials to be found here include teaching guides, references, papers on topics of interest, and instructional materials.

Opposing Viewpoints

There are usually two sides (pro and con) to every issue or argument. *Opposing Viewpoints* allows users to have access to opinion papers, helpful statistics, website links, and newspaper and magazine articles in full-text format. A variety of topics may be searched here, including abortion, animal rights, or health insurance.

PAIS (Public Affairs Information Service) International

Where can a library user find information pertaining to public policy and issues happening in countries around the world? The *PAIS* database contains over 480,000 records which provide an abstract of the article (or material) as well as a useful bibliography for extended reading. Users can utilize this resource to locate information pertaining to public policy and issues happening in approximately 120 countries around the world.

Sociological Abstracts

Approximately 1500 journal titles are indexed at this site. Sources for the material offered herein come from papers delivered at sociology or behavioral science conferences, dissertations, and specific journals in the field. *Sociological abstracts* enables users to read about issues like the development of local or regional communities, social norms and traditions, religions, or the welfare system.

Sports Discus

This new database is devoted to physical education and sports-related subjects. Possible topics to be located here included sports injuries, effects of steroids on physical performance, etc. For more information on any of the databases listed in this article, feel free to contact the Sampson-Livermore Library reference desk at (910) 521-6656, utilize the Ask A Librarian feature from the library's home page, or just stop by at your convenience.
