

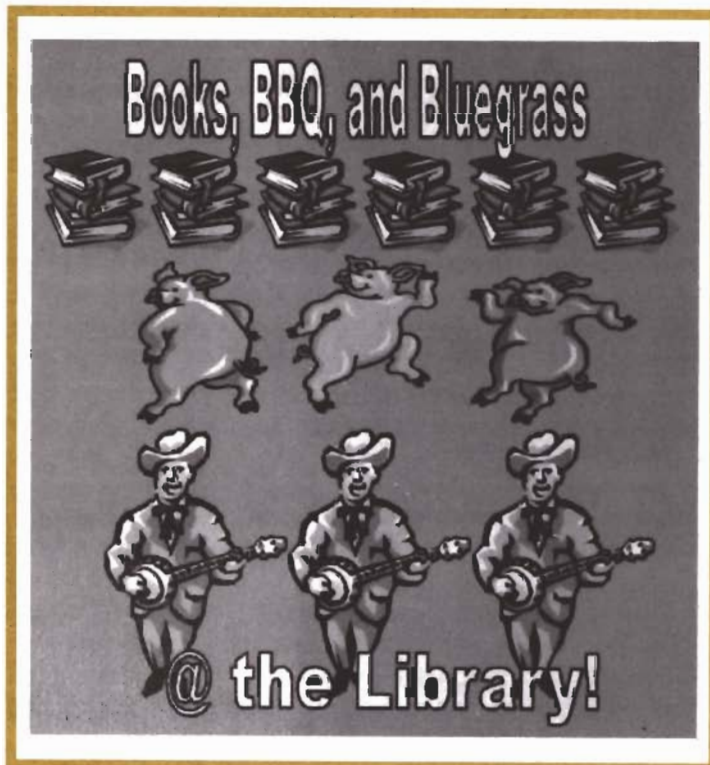

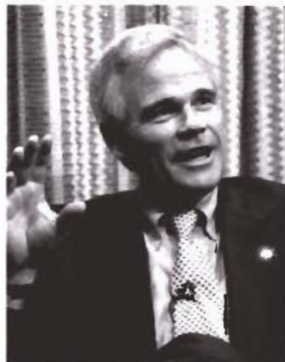

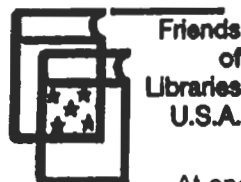

## Message from the President

Libraries and Literacy

At one institution where I once studied as a student, I had the occasion to be a "volunteer for literacy." This involved my working as a tutor with an older individual who could not read. To put it more harshly, this person was a functional illiterate.

However, this client could easily fool almost anyone. She was ashamed of her inability to read, and did her best to mask this fact from her friends, colleagues, and even the younger members of her own family. While I could never know exactly how she felt, I did discern certain things about her behavior. She always responded to color pictures in magazines and she lived in a world of (what I now regard as) extreme memorization. She memorized the bus route, she memorized cooking instructions, and she memorized the location of certain addresses. Needless to say, this was a prodigious task.

I never confused this person's illiteracy with a lack of intelligence. Indeed, the native intelligence was always there, but it had not been stimulated at the proper time. As we worked together, we did make progress, but it was slow, painfully slow. I also had to learn that the teaching of children to read is a very different experience from that of teaching adults. In the end, I learned as much from this experience, as did my client. I never forgot this experience, and it has since caused me to think about literacy and the key role it plays in one's education.

Perhaps it sounds trite to use the shopworn expression, "Reading is fundamental," but it is! Regardless of what one studies, it is the *ability to read* that provides the building blocks for mastering any new discipline or field-of-study. Now that my wife and I are rearing a granddaughter who is now completing the second grade, we have had the chance to observe and learn anew exactly how children learn to read. When you have observed this development over a period of time, it is truly exciting, if not miraculous. Once children can read, there is no end to where their developing and oftentimes myriad interests may take them. They now have a "passport" with no expiration date to any library in the country.

I recently learned that a recent research study about literacy has determined that small children who are placed in the presence of appropriate books and magazines are far more likely to become early readers (or at least book "examiners") than children reared in a home atmosphere that is devoid of books. Children are natural emulators. If they see parents and siblings taking the time to read books and magazines, they are more likely to follow suit.



## "Books, Barbecue, and Bluegrass" Brighten Up the Library

Looking for a quiet night of study in the Sampson-Livermore Library? You won't find it at 6:00 pm on April 23, 2004. Instead, there will be toe tapping and good eats as the Friends of the Library host "Books, Barbecue, and Bluegrass," their third annual benefit. Staff member **Michael Munford** will play his fiddle during the reception and silent auction, which precede a buffet of barbecue and all the fixings fit for any Southern taste. Librarian **Cindy Saylor** will then start an exciting live auction. Next is a program featuring UNCP's own **Shelby Stephenson** and the **Stephenson Family Band**. **Les Sandy**, a well-known bluegrass entertainer and former player with Bill Monroe and his Blue Grass Boys, will entertain with the Stephensons. **D. G. Martin**, host of "North Carolina Bookwatch" and frequent contributor to *Our State* magazine, will round out the evening by speaking on North Carolina literature.

**D. G. Martin** has served as host of "North Carolina Bookwatch" for five years. More than 40 North Carolina newspapers carry his weekly newspaper column "One on One." A North Carolina native, he is a graduate of Davidson College and received a law degree from Yale University. Mr. Martin is active in civic, church, charitable, and professional affairs. He has served as the Carolina's Director of the Trust for Public Land and Interim Executive Director of the Triangle Land Conservancy. Currently he serves on the boards of the North Carolina Writers' Network, UNC-Chapel Hill's University Center for International Studies, North Carolina Chinese Center, and the First Flight Centennial Commission. His ties to UNCP include serving as interim Vice Chancellor for Development and University Affairs from December 1998 until June 1999.

**Shelby Stephenson** is professor of English at UNCP and has edited *Pembroke Magazine* since 1979. He graduated from UNCP-Chapel Hill (where he also studied law), the University of Pittsburgh, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. His career has included being a radio and television announcer, salesman, and farmer. His literary awards include the Zoë Kincaid Brockman Memorial Award, North Carolina Writers' Network Chapbook Prize, and Bright Hill Press Chapbook Award. He and his wife, Linda, live on a small farm where he was born near Benson, N.C.

**Les Sandy** lives in Raeford, N.C. where he was born and raised. He got started in bluegrass during the 1930s. During his career he has played at the Grand Ole Opry and recorded with some of the top bluegrass artists. While working at Sloppy Joe's in Key West, Florida, he regularly played shuffleboard with Ernest Hemingway and met Rita Hayworth. He feels his most exciting career event was the time he went to hear Bill Monroe play in Florence, S.C. Bill Monroe needed a bass fiddle player and Mr. Sandy helped out. After the performance, Les Sandy was asked to play at the Grand Ole Opry.

**Michael Munford** is Systems Library Technical Assistant at the Sampson-Livermore Library. Also a North Carolina native and a student at UNCP, he lives in Bladen County. He enjoys playing the fiddle, mandolin, and guitar. His other talents include Celtic dancing and clogging.

**Cindy Saylor**, Systems Librarian at the Sampson-Livermore Library, has agreed to return this year as auctioneer. Her skills led to a record amount of money being raised during our first live auction. We hope to be even more successful in 2004.

The silent and live auctions will provide an opportunity for ticket holders to take home some unique and interesting items. Among the items offered are handmade Raggedy Ann and Andy dolls, handmade hooked rugs, pieces of art including some by UNCP faculty, North Carolina pottery, gift baskets, food packages, golf packages, clothing, electronic equipment, and various gift certificates. Live auction items include weekends at Myrtle Beach, Caswell Beach, and Lake Lure. The "Books, Barbecue, and Bluegrass" benefit concludes the 2004 National Library Week. ## Something for Everyone @ the Library

There is always something for everyone at the Sampson-Livermore Library and this year we are making that statement our theme for National Library Week, April 18-24, 2004. We'll even be starting one event early, just for the early birds who can't resist a bargain.

The Library Book Sale will begin on Friday, April 16, from 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., but on this day the bargains are limited to members of the Friends of the Library. Primarily, there will be books and magazines for sale on the second floor of the Library, with some non-print materials available. As usual, there will be some bid items. On Monday, April 19, the sale opens to the general public at 9:00 a.m. and closes at 7:00 p.m. On Tuesday and Wednesday, the hours are 9:00 a.m. through 5:00 p.m. Thursday we will only be open from 9:00 a.m. until noon. This gives us time to clean up the book sale and prepare for Friday's benefit and silent auction (see related article). Prices this year are \$1.00 for hardbacks and non-print materials, \$0.50 for paperbacks, and \$0.25 for magazines. We encourage you to come early in order to have the best selection and to find your "something" to take home. If you care to donate materials you no longer need, bring them by the Library. If they complement our collection, we'll add them to it. If not, they will be sold at the book sale to benefit the Friends of the Library.

The staff of the Sampson-Livermore Library wants to spend money wisely and frugally. Replacing long-overdue books is not inexpensive, since out-of-print books may cost many times their original price. Replacing non-print media can be even more expensive. We'd much rather get our original materials back than get cash from our users. This is an opportunity for both the library and people with overdue items to win. During Fine Free Week, April 18-24, 2004, any material checked out from the Sampson-Livermore Library may be returned without fines being charged. If you think you may have something overdue, you can check your circulation record from the library's Web site <http://www.uncp.edu/library>. Help everyone find something at the Library by returning those materials.

On Wednesday, April 21, we will have a live reading of award-winning works from the fifth annual Poetry/Short Prose Contest. The contest was open to UNCP students, area high school students, and the general public and members of the Friends of Sampson-Livermore Library. [See the previous issue of the newsletter for full details about the contest.] The three winners in each of the three categories will be invited to read the pieces selected by the contest judges as winners. At that time, prizes will be distributed with the Kiwanis of Robeson providing the prize for the first-place high school student entry. All other prizes are provided courtesy of the Friends of the Library. The reading will take place in the Library, in the main reading room at 3:30 p.m. Campus authors will also be honored during the program. A reception honoring campus authors and our contest winners will follow in the leisure reading area. A display of selected works by campus authors will be in the Library as well as a bibliography of all works submitted as published. From the quality and variety of entries, there's sure to be something for everyone during the reading.

The week winds up on April 23, 2004, with a benefit dinner featuring D.G. Martin, the Stephenson Family Band with guest Les Sandy, and the library's own Michael Munford. With the theme of "Books, Barbecue, and Bluegrass," there's bound to be something for everyone. For more about the benefit and personalities, see the related articles.

As you've read, the Library has planned over a week full of events. Indeed, especially during this National Library Week there's "Something for Everyone @ the Library."

My parents were also patrons to the county library. They donated to the library books they no longer needed in order that others could read and enjoy them.

Unfortunately, today many people, especially children, grow and develop in a world wherein books and magazines are absent. They shall never know the joy of anticipating what adventure or new experience lurks behind the mere turning of a page!

Libraries are wonderful collections of increasing varieties of learning resources and media, and yet these collections of vast resources are available only to the literate. I urge all "Friends of the Library" to become a friend of literacy as well.

## Library Provides Wireless Laptops for Library Use

On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Sampson-Livermore Library began offering wireless laptops for library use as a new service to its University patrons. The Library has available four wireless-networked laptop computers that may be borrowed for use within the Library. This new service is a result of the expanding need for access to information and software without the constraints of having to remain in a particular location within the Library.

Only current UNCP students, faculty, and staff are eligible to check out the laptop computers, and the Laptop Computer Loan Agreement must be signed each time before a laptop is borrowed. Laptops are checked out from the Circulation Desk and circulate for two-hour increments. They may be renewed, if availability allows. There are rental charges for late returns, liabilities and limitations on use. The computers are part of the library's wireless laptop pilot project that upgraded four older laptops with wireless network cards and the Windows 2000 operating system. Software on the laptops includes the Microsoft Office Suite, both Internet Explorer and Netscape for navigating the Web, and Adobe Acrobat Reader to facilitate reading .pdf documents.

University patrons are able to access their University accounts and download their work through the file transfer protocol (ftp). Software on the laptops allows users to save items during their sessions, but erases all saved items or changes to the laptop when the computer is shutdown and restarted.

If this laptop project is successful, plans are to increase the number to twenty state-of-the-art laptops in the fall 2004 semester.

## Tobacco Money Feeds My Family

Over 100 people gathered in UNCP's Moore Hall on February 5, 2004, to see the documentary film *Tobacco Money Feeds My Family* by Pink Hill native Cynthia Hill. Sponsorship was by the Division of Academic Affairs and the Friends of the Library of UNCP. The Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation, the North Carolina Humanities Council, the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation, and the Flue Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation are representative of the organizations providing major support.

Tobacco is interwoven in the history of North Carolina since the state's founding. In this documentary, Cynthia Hill explores the lives of three tobacco farmers and her own memories of growing up in a tobacco community. The film gives a human face to a controversial subject. The contrast among the farmers highlights the differences between larger, high-tech operations and smaller operations that still use many older farming techniques. The film also points out the problems created by constant cuts in tobacco quotas.

A discussion was held immediately following the presentation. Mr. W. C. Williford, who is a retired Robeson County Extension agent as well as a small tobacco farmer, and Cynthia Hill were available to answer questions and contribute to information about the history and issues involved with tobacco farming. The documentary will be shown again on November 6, 2004, at Robeson County Community College. Two copies of the film are available at the Sampson-Livermore Library for viewing by students, faculty, and staff

## DIAL PERSONNEL MOVED TO NEW OFFICES

If you recently visited the Sampson-Livermore Library in search of the Departments of English, Theatre and Languages, History, or Political Science and Public Administration, you were redirected. These departments, relocated to the Library after the discovery of mold in the Dial Building in October 2003, were moved to new quarters on January 8, 2004.

The English, Theatre and Languages Department and Department of Political Science and Public Administration moved to rooms in Jacobs Hall. The History Department is now located in the History Trailer near the Temporary Math and Science Complex. The *Pembroke Magazine* and the Speech Testing Center have also been relocated to Jacobs Hall.

Janet Gentes, a secretary for the History Department, stated she "really enjoyed the ambience of the library. It is really the 'hub' of research and learning at the college level and being there was a great personal experience for me. I really enjoyed helping students find what they were looking for, when they would assume that because I was in an office in the library, I was a librarian." Janet added that she did refer students to the real librarians when she was not able to assist them.

Dennis Sigmon, Chair of the English, Theatre and Languages Department, also thanked the Library for its support and assistance when the Dial Building was closed. He noted that ETL faculty who shared office space with library staff repeatedly expressed their appreciation for having comfortable work areas. Sigmon noted that "the Sampson-Livermore Library proved a clear example of the team atmosphere that makes UNCP a pleasant work environment."

All the library study rooms that housed the Dial departmental offices are now available for student use except Room 228, the current location of the Writing Center (see related article).

## WRITING CENTER RELOCATED TO LIBRARY

The University Writing Center has been relocated from the Education Building to Room 228 in the Sampson-Livermore Library. This is the second location of the Writing Center since the Dial Humanities Building was closed last October due to mold.

"It is nice having our own space," said Amanda Calvin, Director of the Writing Center. "This (the setting) is closer to what we had in Dial. It has the same type atmosphere." Calvin noted the library location is nice for the students because of the nearby study rooms and library computer labs.

Byran Carter, a graduate student in the English Education program and a Writing Center tutor, noted that the Writing Center is more visible in the Library than in the Education Building. Carter said he had seen some new faces this semester that he did not see last semester.

Calvin said she wanted to thank the University and the students, who have been very supportive during the moves. She also thanked the faculty, who helped spread the word of the Writing Center's new location and encouraged students to use their services.
