Library Goes Portable, Instant, and Wireless

The Sampson-Livermore Library strives to identify technologies that improve or enhance both the services we provide and the access to our information resources. In response to a recent library survey of UNCP students and trends identified through usage data, the Library has purchased new digital media equipment and modified some of the circulation periods of existing equipment.

Portable MP3 players – The acquisition of five portable MP3 players allows patrons to take advantage of NetLibrary's eAudiobooks, a recent NC LIVE addition. This collection includes unabridged versions of the latest bestsellers, book club favorites, award-winning authors, and Pimsleur language study courses. Available at <http://0-www.nclive.org.uncclc.coast.uncwil.edu/cgi-bin/nclsm?rsrc=110> or from the Library's website at www.uncp.edu/library/, eAudiobooks may be downloaded and kept for three weeks. The MP3 players, which circulate for three weeks, are available for checkout to UNCP students, faculty, and staff at the Circulation Desk.

Portable DVD players – Due to the increased usage of our wireless laptops for watching DVDs from our expanding collection, the Library now offers five portable DVD players for use in the Library only. The portable DVD players circulate

for three hours and are available for checkout to UNCP students, faculty, and staff at the Circulation Desk. The Library also offers a multimedia room for watching movies in DVD, VHS, and laserdisc formats. The key to access the multimedia room (240-G) is available at the Circulation Desk.

Instant messaging reference service – Instant messaging (IM) is more popular with students than previously realized. As such, the Library has recognized there is a large group of our constituency that may prefer to ask for assistance through "IMing" rather than visiting, telephoning, or e-mailing the Library. During scheduled hours, the reference staff provides assistance to patrons with AIM, MSN, and Yahoo accounts (see related article, p.10).

Wireless laptops – Increases in class size and the number of library instruction sessions being delivered motivated the purchase of six additional wireless laptops. For use when the number of participants exceeds the number of workstations in the Library's electronic classroom, the laptops will allow two classmates to share a single workstation, but each student will be able to receive individual hands-on experience. In addition, the 15 wireless laptops that are available for library use now circulate for 3 hours instead of 2.

Message from the FOL President And That's a Very Good Thing!


I must say the Friends of the Library organization is, with apology to Martha Stewart, a very good thing.

Move Over E-Mail ... Here Comes Instant Messaging!

Sampson-Livermore Library is really excited about offering instant messaging - that's "IM" to those of you not familiar with the lingo - as part of our already excellent reference services.

Reference in libraries historically involved face-to-face interactions between patrons and library staff. Telephones gradually made it so that patrons did not have to physically enter the library. E-mail totally revolutionized library reference service because it is fast, offered 24/7, and available to anyone with online access.

Well, move over e-mail. Enter instant messaging to take it up a notch. Instant messaging allows for immediate communication between two or more users who are all online simultaneously. Now, during specified hours, patrons may pose questions to our Reference Services staff while also completing research, typing a paper, surfing the Internet, listening to iTunes, or watching MTV. Whereas some patrons prefer to speak one-on-one with library staff or e-mail a question and check back later for an answer, others prefer to pose an IM question and work on other priorities while waiting for a more immediate reply to appear on their desktop.

"We are trying to accommodate the various communication preferences of all of our patrons. Ease of access to resources and services is our priority," said **Dr. Elinor Foster**, Dean of Library Services.

The new Reference Services webpage www.uncp.edu/library/reference/im details everything users need to know in order to use our IM reference service, including links to download IM software, service availability schedules, netiquette tips, and FAQs. The Reference Services screen name is UNCPREF for the three major IMing companies: AIM, MSN, and Yahoo.

Of course, the Library continues to offer reference assistance at the Reference Desk, on the telephone at 910.521.6656, and via e-mail at refdesk@uncp.edu.

Staffing Updates, Recognitions, and Other Important News



Librarian Moves into New Phase of Her Career

Lillian D. Brewington, Government Documents/Special Collections Librarian, began a new era in her professional life on July 1, 2006. After more than 33 years of employment at The University of North Carolina at Pembroke, Lillian started phased retirement.

Lillian's distinguished career began in 1964, when she worked as a Records Clerk in the Registrar's Office for two-and-a-half years. After living in Maryland for eight years, Lillian returned to Pembroke and began working in the Library's Technical Services on July 17, 1975. The setup of Technical Services afforded her the opportunity to work in several different capacities including purchasing, accessioning, and labeling. Lillian also dealt with "anything else that needed to be done."

In July 1980, Lillian became secretary to **Dr. Robert Hersch**, Library Director. She also was head of the Government Documents Services. Always looking for a new challenge, Lillian became the Circulation Librarian from July 1987 until she graduated from North Carolina Central University with the Master of Library Science. From 1989 to 2006 she was the Government Documents/Special Collections Librarian, which remained her title until her phased retirement began.

During Lillian's years of service to the campus, she worked with four library

directors (**Miles L. Raisig**, **Dr. Hersch**, **Dr. Clarence Toomer**, and **Dr. Elinor Foster**), witnessed campus leadership by four chancellors (**Drs. English Jones**, **Paul Givens**, **Joseph Oxendine**, and **Allen Meadors**), and worked in each of the Library's service areas except Serials Services.

When asked what she planned to do during her retirement, Lillian said her future looked very bright. During a one-month leave from UNCP, she traveled to the beaches and mountains of North Carolina with her family. After her leave, Lillian returned to work as the Special Collections Librarian.

Her schedule of 20 hours per week allows Lillian to "come in late and leave early," giving her more time to spend with her husband, children, and grandchildren. Looking to what the future holds in store also brought Lillian a bit of nostalgia. Some of her favorite memories include riding to work with her father and sister (former Police Chief **Haynes Deese** and secretary for the Physical Science Department **Linda Deese Oxendine**, respectively), being part of a library staff that was "more like family than coworkers," and being able to help hire **Carlene Cummings** and **Nickie Blanton**, who are "two of the best assistants a supervisor would ever want."

The staff of the Sampson-Livermore Library would like to thank Lillian for her dedication to her job, coworkers, and campus community.

October 3 will feature memory expert **Scott Hagwood**, author of *Memory Power:*




