Her humor, often described as “an edgy Erma,” is the result of her growing up in the poor but colorful countryside of eastern North Carolina. Ms. Rivenbark is known for her syndicated humor column that appears in papers throughout the country. This column was the inspiration for her first book, *Bless Your Heart, Tramp*. It was a bestselling title in the Southeast. *We’re Just Like You, Only Prettier* was her next book and was the winner of the Southern Booksellers Alliance Award for Non-Fiction Book of the Year in 2004. In 2006 her next release, *Stop Dressing Your Six-Year-Old Like a Skank*, was named best title of the year by the magazine *Entertainment Weekly*. Her new book, *Belle Weather: Mostly Sunny with a Chance of Scattered Hissy Fits*, was released in August 2008. There is no doubt that her presentation at the benefit will be entertaining.

“Celebrating Your Southern Self @ the Library” will remind you of the pleasures of being Southern and living in the South. Money raised at this benefit will support the Friends of the Library initiatives such as continued support for four scholarships established to assist students at UNCP, funding the McNaughton leasing program for popular reading materials and movies on DVD, underwriting projects in the Library’s archives and special collections areas, and sponsorship of author appearance as well as reading programs. 
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## Message from the FOL President

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## Update on the Proposed Information Commons Building

As was discussed by Provost Charles Harrington at our Friends of the Library Donor Recognition Soirée of October 8, 2008, a state-of-the-art library/information commons building is on the horizon for UNC Pembroke. The 2008 session of the North Carolina General Assembly which ended in May appropriated \$2.5 million in planning money for the new facility. At the time this facility was anticipated to cost \$47.5 million to construct after the planning process. When completed it will be the largest building on campus and will accommodate library services as well as offices of several other campus operations.

At this writing, however, the planning process has not begun due to budget constraints. The proposed new library/information commons building is needed **NOW** so it's discouraging that the project has apparently been delayed. More information about the progress of this project will be included in *Library Lines* as developments occur.

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## Multifarious Celebrations of Black History Month @ Our Library

On February 3, 2009, the Mary Livermore Library kicked off its celebration of Black History Month with a presentation by **Mama Dip (Mildred Council)**, the owner of a well-known restaurant in Chapel Hill that specializes in what Mama Dip calls “country cooking.”

Mama Dip, in a low-key, intimate conversation with her audience, shared her recollections of starting the restaurant with very little money, but with lots of support from her family and business colleagues. In fact, the very first meal she served at the restaurant was actually food she had purchased to cook lunch for her children whom she had brought to the restaurant with her. However, when customers showed up wanting to purchase meals, she sold them her family’s home-cooked food and then bought more meat and vegetables to cook for her family and other customers. At the end of the day, she was astonished at the amount of money her simple, country food had brought in. Her restaurant continued to grow from this impromptu, hurriedly prepared meal to being a landmark establishment in Chapel Hill.

Mama Dip was accompanied by her daughter, **Spring Council**, who shared her memories of a loving mother who still

managed to give her children lots of attention, in spite of her demanding schedule at the restaurant. Several of Mama Dip’s children now work at the restaurant with her.

The only thing missing from this presentation was that Mama Dip did not get an opportunity to prepare one of her signature dishes for the audience.

On February 11, the Library continued its celebration of Black History Month by cosponsoring a series of events commemorating the 20<sup>th</sup> National African American Read-In (AARI). The annual Read-In activities are designed to promote literacy among African Americans. The UNCP African American Read-In events this year were cosponsored by the Friends of the Library, the Office of Multicultural and Minority Affairs, the School of Education, the Office of Academic Affairs, and FirstBook.

The first AARI event, held on February 11, featured an African storyteller, **Obakunle Akinlana**. Mr. Akinlana, accompanied by a talented dancer, shared traditional African folktales and history, using drums, shakers, and other traditional African musical instruments. The audience particularly enjoyed the parts of the program that allowed them to participate. At one point, Mr. Akinlana robed two audience members in traditional African garments as he taught the audience Yoruba, a Nigerian language, words for each piece of clothing. Later in the program, some members of the audience formed an African band while the remaining audience members became African dancers. The music and the dancing may not have been the best, but the enthusiasm and enjoyment were at the top of the chart.

The second AARI program, held on February 13, was a Children's Hour. During this event, African American children's stories were read to a group of youngsters from the Shining Stars Preschool and Daycare of Pembroke and two groups of youngsters from the Greengrove Headstart Program in Fairmont. The readers for the event were UNCP students from **Dr. Swanee Dickson's** elementary education class.

The third event in the AARI series, held in the Library on February 17, was an oral readings program. Participants in this program included **Katy Locklear**, Miss UNCP 2009; **Nefertiti Byrd**, Miss Black North Carolina USA 2009; **Amanda McCoy**, Miss Teen Essence USA of Wake County; UNCP students and faculty; and **Sherwin Rice**, the Vice President of the North Carolina Library Association. They all read favorite poems, passages, and excerpts from African-American-authored literature.

The fourth, and final, event of the African American Read-In series was a book discussion of **Cornel West's** latest book, *Hope on a Tightrope: Words and Wisdom*. The discussion was led by **Dr. Scott Hicks**, an associate professor in the UNCP English Department. Dr. Hicks was joined by five UNCP panelists: **Sally Vallabha**, a faculty member in the Chemistry Department; **Dr. Frankie Powell**, an associate professor in the School of Education; **Jamel Porter**, Vice President of the Student Government Association; **Quinn Davis**, President of the African American Student Organization; and **Carine Francois**, President of the UNCP Chapter of The National Council of Negro Women. After a lively and insightful discussion of various aspects of the book, **Trin-A-Thoughts (Petrina Bryant)**, a NAACP House Poet, ended the program with one of her original poems, *The Village*.

All of the Black History Month activities were well attended; many community supporters and students came to the events and enjoyed themselves. Audience participation this year was phenomenal, particularly at the African storyteller event. The presenters and topics at the Library's Black History Month activities just keep getting better; the cosponsors are already looking forward to planning even more exciting and thought-provoking events for next year.

## Electronic Resources Update

The Mary Livermore Library is constantly looking for, examining, and testing resources for possible addition to the Library's collection of electronic resources. With that in mind, there have been some changes since last fall. These updates include the addition of electronic databases and many new e-book collections.



Nearly everyone is familiar with the platform available through Ebsco. Through this platform, the Library has added four new resources. First, in the area of education, we have added *Education Resource Complete*. This resource contains a large collection of the full text for more than 1,050 education journals, indexing for almost 1,900 journals, and the full text for 133 books/monographs. Areas covered include curriculum instruction as well as administration, policy, funding, and related social issues. Second, we have added *Hospitality and Tourism Complete*. This resource covers scholarly research and industry news relating to hospitality and tourism. There is full text for 440 publications, including periodicals, company and country reports, and books. The third resource, added through NCLIVE, is *Literary Resource Center*. The resource is a full-text database that combines information from major respected reference works, books, and literary journals, as well as original content from EBSCO Publishing. Contained within is full text for approximately 31,000 plot summaries, synopses, and work overviews; approximately 100,000 articles/essays of literary criticism; approximately 140,000 author biographies; articles from more than 430 literary journals; more than 613,000 book reviews; approximately 100,000 classic and contemporary poems and short stories; author interviews; and many classic texts. The fourth resource added under the Ebsco platform is *Newspaper Source Plus*. The resource provides cover-to-cover full text for 149 national and international newspapers and selective full text for more than 410 American newspapers. In addition, this resource provides complete coverage for over 250 top U.S. college and university newspapers and general coverage for more than 850 more college newspapers. Selective transcripts from CBS News, CNN, CNN International, FOX News, and National Public Radio (NPR) are also included.

Due to several factors, including more distance education and off-campus students, and a severe space crunch, the Library is examining and adding more electronic books (e-books). Many know we already subscribe to *Books 24x7*, which focuses mostly on business and information technology (IT) titles. To serve our patrons better, we have added e-books from *Ebrary*, *R2 Digital Library*, *Gale*, and *ABC-CLIO*.



The Ebrary Academic Complete collection contains more than 40,000 titles in over 16 subject areas. The R2 Digital Library from Rittenhouse contains selected e-books focusing in the allied health, medicine, and nursing subject areas. We have also added several reference resources available through *ABC-CLIO* to our collection of e-books. Titles include *African American Experience*, *Issues Understanding Controversy*, *Ancient World History*, *Latin American Experience*, *Pop Culture Universe*, *World History Ancient and Medieval*, and the *American Indian Experience*. Additional resources added within the e-book area include an expansion of our *Gale Literary Resources*. The *Gale* resources already included some familiar titles such as *Contemporary Authors* and the *Dictionary of Literary Biography*. With the expansion included are many of the literary criticism titles, such as *19<sup>th</sup> Century Literary Criticism* and *Short Story Literary Criticism*.

Finally, we have added *Oxford Language Dictionaries Online*. This resource currently features over 4 million words, phrases, and translations, to offer coverage of Chinese, French, German, Italian, Russian, and Spanish, into and out of English. People will find it is easy for this resource to translate many words into any corresponding language.

In addition, we have expanded the number of items in our *Sage* and *Oxford* electronic reference items.

Another exciting resource added to our collection includes the *Mango Languages Resource*. Mango provides the educational tools to learn foreign languages online. Currently available are lessons for 12 different language courses: Brazilian Portuguese, Spanish, Japanese, French, German, Italian, Greek, Russian, Mandarin Chinese, and English for Polish, Spanish, and Brazilian speakers.

Finally, through NCLIVE the *SimplyMaps* resource is now part of our collection. *SimplyMap* allows the user to create thematic maps and reports using demographic, business, and marketing data.

## Kudos and Happenings

Employees of the Mary Livermore Library have continued a tradition of active engagement in scholarly pursuits by attending professional conferences, contributing articles to peer-reviewed journals, and making presentations on a variety of library or technology-related topics.

**Michael Alewine**, Outreach/Distance Education Librarian, and **Robert Arndt**, Reference/Instructional Services Librarian, presented “Using a Variety of Technologies to Provide Library Services for Distance Education Students” at the UNC Teaching and Learning with Technology Conference held March 17-19. The presentation was made available as a Flash Video and discussed the use of software applications, such as RefWorks, or specific pieces of application functionality, such as the signatures feature in Microsoft Outlook, that are employed to provide research assistance to students involved with UNCP’s off-campus and online programs.

Michael Alewine and **Anthony Holderied**, Instructional Services/Reference Librarian, presented “Engaging Learners Using Interactive Technology in the Classroom” on March 28 at the Digital Content Consortium, which was sponsored by The University of North Carolina at Pembroke Digital Academy. The presentation covered the pedagogical uses of interactive whiteboards, student response systems, and wireless slates in the classroom.

Anthony Holderied’s article, “Library Assessment from a Fresh Perspective” was published in the January 2009 issue of *Library Connect Newsletter* [<http://libraryconnect.elsevier.com/ln/0701/ln070110.html>]. The article discusses what “Next Gen” librarians have to offer beyond an affinity for technology, and specifically addresses Anthony’s assessment activities at Mary Livermore Library in relation to the University’s upcoming SACS (Southern Association of Colleges and Schools) reaffirmation of accreditation process.

Anthony’s recent scholarship also includes “Institutional Repositories Provide Open Access to Scholarly Communication,” published in the March 2009 issue of *Associates: The Electronic Support Staff Journal* [[http://associates.ucr.edu/journal/?page\\_id=314](http://associates.ucr.edu/journal/?page_id=314)]. This article provides an overview of institutional repositories (IRs) and the benefits of open access to faculty and student scholarship. He also examines the evolution of NC DOCKS, which is a consortial institutional repository initiative involving UNCP, Appalachian State University, East Carolina University, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and the University of North Carolina Wilmington. Anthony also discusses issues related to creating an institutional repository, such as copyright, costs, and marketing.

**Nickie Blanton**, former University Library Technician for Media Cataloging, has joined the administrative staff at the Robeson Community College (RCC) Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit corporation that “receives, holds, invests, and disburses funds for the purpose of providing scholarships to students,” according to the website. Nickie worked at UNCP for almost nine years. In 1999, Nickie worked on contract for Government Documents and Special Collections areas of library service. From August 2000 until the end of September 2006, she was the Government Documents Library Assistant. In October of 2006, she became the University Library Technician for Media Cataloging.

When summing up her experience, Nickie stated “My years at UNCP were formative. I gained skills - both occupational and personal - that I will always use.
