African American Read-In Returns

The Friends of the Library of UNC Pembroke, along with the Office of Multicultural and Minority Affairs and the School of Education, will once again take part in the National African American Read-In in February. This will be the 23rd National African American Read-In and the fifth year that UNCP has participated in this event. The National African American Read-In is sponsored by the Black Caucus of the National Council of Teachers of English, as well as the National Council of Teachers of English. The goal is to make the celebration of African American literacy a traditional part of Black History Month activities.

On February 6 noted author **Carole Boston Weatherford** will speak in the main reading room of the Mary Livermore Library at 7:00 p.m. Mrs. Weatherford is a *New York Times* best-selling children’s author and poet. Her works include: *Juneteenth Jamboree*; *Moses: When Harriet Tubman Led Her People to Freedom*, which was a 2005 Caldecott Award winner; *Freedom on the Menu: The Greensboro Sit-Ins*; and *Before John was a Jazz Giant: A Song of John Coltrane*. She has won the North Carolina Juvenile Literature Award several times, received the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, and been awarded the Ragan-Rubin Award from the North Carolina English Teachers Association. She is a graduate of the Master of Fine Arts program at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Mrs. Weatherford is currently teaching at Fayetteville State University.

UNCP faculty, staff, and students will visit R. B. Dean Elementary School in Maxton on February 13 to read African American children’s literature in grades pre-K through four.

On February 22 the Library will host “Speaking Our Words, Recitations of African American Literature” at 6:30 p.m. in the main reading room. UNCP students, faculty, staff, and special guests will read and recite their favorite poems, passages, and excerpts from African American literature.

The final event of the African American Read-In will be February 27 at 7:00 p.m. in the main reading room of the Mary Livermore Library. **Dr. Booker T. Anthony** will give a presentation called “The African American Church in Works by Ernest J. Gaines.” This project is made possible by a grant from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide nonprofit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Dr. Anthony is a North Carolina native. He is currently the Director of the Honors Program at Fayetteville State University as well as a professor in the English Department. He was named FSU’s Teacher of the Year in 2008-09 and was the recipient of the UNC Board of Governor’s Teaching Excellence award in 2009. He is also an ordained Baptist minister and pastor of R.E.F.U.G.E. (Reestablishing Families Using Godly Ethics) Community Church in Fayetteville.

Message from the Dean of Library Services

Library use has been robust this fall and it is gratifying to know that our excellent resources are being taken advantage of by faculty, staff, students, and community members. To cite a few statistics that will illustrate the level of library use, in October, there were 21,224 instances of entry into the Library; 2,345 monographs and 4,507 media items were circulated externally; 1,843 reference questions were answered; and 43 library-use instruction sessions were provided to a total of 712 persons. The study rooms and other study areas have been well utilized and laptop computers were in demand, the computers having been checked out 542 times in October.

Our Elmer W. Hunt photographs discussion series for 2011-12 began November 1 with a program featuring the Veterans of Foreign Wars that was well attended and a November 15 program featuring **Dr. David LaVere**, professor of history at UNC Wilmington speaking on "What Happened to the Lost Colony?", was also well attended.

The Library is a place of discovery. Through its collections, we can uncover what others have discovered before us and build on that foundation with our own discoveries that contribute to human knowledge and understanding.

The Mary Livermore Library is fortunate to have several unique collections among its Special Collections. One special collection is more than 53,000 photos taken by Elmer W. In the spring, there are two more opportunities to search the photo collection and identify the people pictured there. On January 24, the Elmer W. Hunt Photograph Identification and Discussion Series will highlight *Strike at the Wind!*, and on March 20 the series will focus on the Lumbee Regional Development Association (LRDA) and Lumbee Homecoming.

I invite you to be a part of these events and discover more about the unique heritage of this region. If you lived and worked here during that time, you can help build history through identifying individuals in the Hunt Photography Collection. This magnificent collection will be here, in the Library, for future generations to discover.

New Scholarship Added to the Friends of the Library Awards

Since 2005 The Friends of the Library of UNC Pembroke have awarded tuition assistance and book purchase scholarships to dozens of students. This program will continue with the announcement of the awards at the April 13, 2012, benefit evening. The setting for these announcements is a fitting one, because it is due to proceeds from the annual benefit evening that the Friends of the Library have the resources to provide the scholarship awards.

The 2012-13 awards will include a new scholarship which is jointly funded by an individual donor who is a friend of education, the noted educator, author, and businessman **Dr. Ben Chavis**, and the Friends of the Library of UNC Pembroke.

The new scholarship, which will provide \$1,000 in tuition assistance, is the Ben Chavis, Grandmother Lela Locklear Chavis and Great-Great Grandfather John Archie Locklear/ Friends of the Library Endowed Scholarship. It is to be awarded to an undergraduate, full-time student who is majoring in math or a science-related field of study.

Dr. Ben Chavis, a Robeson County native who now lives in Oakland, California, but who retains a farm in Robeson County, provided funds for the new scholarship with the intent of honoring his ancestors for their belief in educational opportunities for young people. As is stated in the gift agreement pertaining to the scholarship, the award has been established “to affirm and promote their [Dr. Chavis’s scholarship namesake ancestors] belief in the enduring value of education and in the importance of applying oneself in order to achieve success. This endowed scholarship is meant to encourage and inspire recipients to perform at an optimal level of excellence and to provide financial support as they pursue their field of study. The Donor believes that education is a means of broadening one’s horizons, not only in the pursuit of a career but also in the quest for a future that is open to the many possibilities that come with a strong educational foundation.”

The new scholarship, as well as three other tuition assistance and four book purchase assistance scholarships, can be applied for through the Library’s website (www.uncp.edu/library/), where an application form is available, or with paper application forms that are available in the Mary Livermore Library. Information about the amounts of the scholarship awards, requirements for eligibility, and application procedures accompany the application forms. The deadline for applying for the Friends of the Library scholarships is March 1, 2012.

Budget Woes Continue to Impact the Library

Since the last update in 2009, the national and state economies continue to impact the Mary Livermore Library. As most of you know, the University of North Carolina system and consequently UNC Pembroke has dealt with the loss of state funds. Very hard decisions have been made on how to maintain with less money UNCP's level of teaching excellence and provide a quality learning environment for our students. The Library has felt these pains and has made every effort to provide the same first-rate level of services and resources at reduced funding.

Specific impacts include not filling three positions in the Technical Services unit. There are three positions in an inactive status, the Electronic Resources/Media Catalog Librarian, the University Library Technician for Media Cataloging, and the University Library Technician for Cataloging Services. This means Cataloging Services has returned to the staffing level of 1994, when Library funding was significantly lower and the University student population was half the size that it is now. Unfortunately, this means that the time to catalog and process materials for inclusion into the collection has lengthened. Rush materials that have "holds" on them and are needed immediately for instruction or research purposes are processed. However, we do not enjoy the fact that not everything can be done in a timely manner.

The Library's operating budget was impacted significantly, with a lower level of funding. There was no enrollment growth funding this year and the Library has returned \$351,000 to the state at this point. Additionally, the Library has been asked to hold back 10 percent of operating funds in case additional monies must be returned. This means that the Library has drastically reduced equipment and supplies accounts. The costs to cover copyright and interlibrary fees are not at the level the Library was once able to provide. The materials budget has felt a drastic reduction. Departmental allocations have remained level. However, there are reduced funding levels for electronic resources, continuations, binding, and microfilm. The Library has been able to maintain the same level of serial subscriptions by changing the format from print to electronic for numerous titles. The Library cut 240 print serials that were available in the electronic databases. Every effort has been made to maintain resources needed by the University community. The Library studied usage statistics, resources needed for accreditation purposes, and communicated with departments on campus that may be impacted by loss of a resource.

We understand that the Library must do its part to cover the reduced funding, but we definitely are looking forward to brighter days and an improved economy.

Elmer W. Hunt Series Continues

The Elmer W. Hunt Photograph Collection Identification and Discussion Series has two events planned for spring 2012.

On Tuesday, January 24, the program will focus on *Strike at the Wind!*, the outdoor drama depicting the life of Henry Berry Lowrie. The panel for this series will include **Harvey Godwin, Dr. Chet Jordan, Terena Nephew, Carol Oxendine,** and **Dr. David Oxendine.**

Harvey Godwin, a 1991 graduate of Pembroke State University, played Henry Berry Lowrie for numerous seasons. Mr. Godwin is the owner of Two Hawks Employment Services of Lumberton. Dr. Jordan has been both a stage manager and director of *Strike at the Wind!* and is a member of the English and Theater Department at UNCP. Terena Nephew is a 1992 graduate of Pembroke State University. She is the daughter of **Hope Shepherd**, who was the first Rhoda Strong in *Strike at the Wind!* Carol Oxendine played the Leader, the narrator of the Henry Berry Lowrie story, for many years. Dr. Oxendine directed *Strike at the Wind!* for 15 years. Dr. Oxendine is a member of the School of Education at UNCP.

The second Elmer W. Hunt Photograph Collection Identification Series discussion will be held on Tuesday, March 20. The focus of this event will be the Lumbee Regional Development Association (LRDA) and Lumbee Homecoming. Panelists for the event will include: **Ken Maynor, William Locklear, Lorna Ricotta, Hazel Perez,** and **Dr. Cheryl Locklear.**

Ken Maynor is a longtime executive director of the Lumber Regional Development Association. William Locklear also has a long association with LRDA. Lorna Ricotta, a former Miss Lumbee, was the first Lumbee to win the Miss North Carolina pageant. She is currently a member of the UNCP's Board of Trustees. She was also recently named to the *Fayetteville Observer's* 40 Under 40 list of business and community leaders. Hazel Perez has been involved with LRDA and the Lumbee pageants for a number of years. She is Health Services Director for LRDA. Dr. Locklear was the first Miss Lumbee and has served as a member of The University of North Carolina Board of Governors. Dr. Locklear has also served on the UNCP Board of Trustees and was named Distinguished Alumna in 1993.

Both discussions will be held in the main reading room of the Mary Livermore Library at beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Will Thirteen Be Lucky for the Poetry/Short Prose Contest?

Only you and our contestants will be able to answer that! It is hard to believe that the contest has been going for 13 years. Over the years, we have watched the contest grow from a very local event to a regional competition. The Mary Livermore Library will again team up with the Kiwanis of Robeson-Lumberton in order to attract the best in writing. First place winners will receive \$250; second place, \$150; and third place, \$100. (In the case of a tie, the prize money may be divided.) The Kiwanis will provide prizes for the high school student category.

Once judged, the winning entries will be checked to see if they were plagiarized, if the judges didn't find them first. Copying a really moving story off the Internet or from Facebook or slightly modifying an e-mail will be discovered and will be disqualified. This can be very embarrassing and will certainly mean you cannot win any prize money. Remember that plagiarism is theft of another's words or ideas. Stealing is just wrong, and at the university level, can be an Honor Code violation.

The deadline for submission of entries this year is February 29, 2012, Leap Year Day. The entry form is included in the newsletter and a link is included from the Library's website: <http://www.uncp.edu/library>. Winners will be invited to read their winning piece on April 11, 2012, during National Library Week.

Each year we get frequently asked questions. These include:

- Q) Shouldn't I put my name on the entry? After all, you won't know who wrote it if I don't!
- A) If you do, then no judge ever sees it. If they don't see it, you cannot win. When your entry comes in, it is immediately coded and that code is placed on your entry form. That way if Entry A23 wins, the form can be pulled and we will know who wrote the piece – with skill, it will be you!
- Q) So I cannot sign my name. Can I include it in the story or poem?
- A) If you include your name in any fashion, including dedicating it to your parents or other relatives, your entry will be discarded and the judges will never see it and you cannot win.
- Q) What happens if I have 501 words? Do you really count the words? Does the title count?
- A) Yes, we really count the words; with 501 words, your entry will be discarded. No, the title doesn't count towards the 500 words.
- Q) Can I just write my entries neatly? What if I print them by hand?
- A) Writing the entry by hand is against the rules and your entry will be discarded.
- Q) What if I have trouble with spelling? Will that disqualify my entry?
- A) Misspelled words do not disqualify an entry, but the judges tend to mark down an entry with misspelled words and bad grammar, so it does significantly hurt your chances for winning.
- Q) What about the form? Do I have to fill it out completely?
- A) Yes. We need to know in which category to place your entry and how to contact you.
- Q) What if it snows and I can't get to post office by February 29?
- A) If the Public Schools of Robeson County close, we will accept entries postmarked on the day they next open.
- Q) I have two great entries. Can I send in both of them?
- A) If you do, the first one opened will be entered (if it qualifies) and the other one discarded.
- Q) What about pictures or graphics? Can I include them?
- A) You may, but the judges will be getting photocopies. Sometimes graphics can obscure the words and that hurts the chances that the entry will win. If you include graphics, you might want to photocopy your entry to see what the judges will get.
- Q) I work at UNCP? Can I enter?
- A) Yes, in the "General" category.

We welcome the entries we see each year. Help us celebrate our 13th "birthday" by making it the biggest yet! Submit your creative works and encourage others to do the same.

Poetry and Short Prose Contest Guidelines

This contest is jointly sponsored by the Friends of the Library of The University of North Carolina at Pembroke and the Kiwanis of Robeson, with the latter organization generously providing the funding for the prizes for the high school students.

1. The entries must be 500 words or less and must be typed. All words, excluding the title, will count toward the total. **Any entry exceeding the limit will be eliminated.** Any incomplete entry form will result in the elimination of the accompanying entry.
2. The entries must be original and unpublished.
3. One entry per person will be accepted and an entry form must accompany the entry.
4. All entries will be blind-judged, so only the title will appear on the submission. The judges' decisions will be final. **Any copies of the poetry/prose with the author's name on the piece will be eliminated.** The author's name should appear on the entry form only.
5. There are three categories:
UNCP students,
Area high school students,
General public, must be 18 years of age or older.
6. Cash prizes will be awarded in each category:
\$250 for first place,
\$150 for second place,
\$100 for third place.
7. Each writer of an award winning entry will be invited to read the piece at a program during National Library Week. The award winning entries may be published in *Library Lines*. **Submission of an entry grants permission to publish the entry in the newsletter.**
8. Deadline for submission of the entry with an application is February 29, 2012. Any entries postmarked after this date will not be accepted.

External Funding Received at the Library!

Karen Fritts, Government Documents/Development Librarian, has recently written two grants for the Library. The first grant is an LSTA NC ECHO Digitization Grant from the State Library of North Carolina in the amount of \$34,400. The proposal of the grant was to secure funds to establish a temporary position within the Library to create the metadata for the Elmer W. Hunt Photograph Collection. The goal for this grant activity is to create an online database where the images can be accessed from anywhere in the world. One of the steps in this process is the creation of the metadata, which will identify each photo and allow the photographs to be found when searched. The grant runs from July 1, 2011, to June 30, 2012.

The Library has also received a grant from the Traveling Archivist Program, associated with the North Carolina State Archives section of the State Library of North Carolina. This grant program is a continuation of a previous grant that the Library received in 2009-10. This revisit will bring back the archivist, who will do an in-depth analysis of one particular area and help create a plan to preserve that collection. Archivist **Dr. Harry Keiner** will examine the negatives in the Elmer W. Hunt Collection and establish the best way to preserve and store the negatives for the long term.

These grants will further the development of plans to expand the availability and usefulness of special collection resources of the Mary Livermore Library.
