





Articulation Agreement
University of North Carolina at Pembroke
and Southeastern Community College
and Whiteville City Schools
Teacher Education
January 21, 2022

This Articulation Agreement is established by and between the University of North Carolina at Pembroke, Southeastern Community College, and Whiteville City Schools and is applicable to students who complete the required hours for the Associate of Arts in Teacher Preparation or Associate of Science in Teacher Preparation from Southeastern Community College and transfer to the University of North Carolina at Pembroke and complete a major in the Educator Preparation Program (EPP). Transfers who have not completed the Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. Participants will be part of Whiteville City Schools Teacher Outreach program to recruit and retain teachers for Whiteville City Schools.

The University of North Carolina at Pembroke, located in Pembroke, NC, is a four-year public university and part of the University of North Carolina system. UNC Pembroke is regionally accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to award Baccalaureate and Master's level degrees.

Southeastern Community College, located in Whiteville, NC, is a two-year public community college and part of the North Carolina Community College System. Southeastern Community College is regionally accredited by the Southern Association of College and Schools Commission on Colleges to award associate degrees, diplomas and certificates.

Whiteville City Schools, located in Whiteville, NC, is public school unit comprised of five schools: Whiteville Primary, Edgewood Elementary, Central Middle, Whiteville High School, and North Whiteville Academy. The current population Pre K-12, is approximately 2300 students. Whiteville City Schools is accredited by the North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement, the Northwest Accreditation Commission, and the Southern Association for Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement.

## The parties agree to the following:

 Students will complete the AA or AS in Teacher Preparation with a GPA of 2.7 or better at Southeastern Community College or they will use their first semester at UNC Pembroke to earn a GPA of 2.7 or better.

- 2. All students must meet UNC Pembroke transfer admissions requirements. The student must complete a UNC Pembroke application. Final admission to UNC Pembroke is contingent upon the submission of an official Southeastern Community College transcript as well as official transcripts from any other college from which credits are used to meet graduation requirements prior to enrolling at UNC Pembroke. OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS no matter what.
- 3. Only courses with a grade of "C" or higher will be accepted for transfer credit except for EDU 216 which requires a grade of B- or better for admission to the EPP. If students do not earn a B- or better at Southeastern Community College, they will retake the course at UNC Pembroke.
- 4. Students must complete a minimum of 9 hours of Writing Intensive courses at UNC Pembroke.

  Graduation from UNC Pembroke is based on successful completion of General Education, which is required for all baccalaureate degrees, and upon successful completion of a specialized program for a major.
- 5. UNC Pembroke does not limit the number of transfer credits which a student can transfer; however, a minimum of 25 percent of the semester hours applied toward a bachelor's degree must be earned through regular enrollment in UNC Pembroke. For more information, please refer to UNC Pembroke's specific degree requirements for majors. A course equivalency chart is attached to this document (Attachment A).
- 6. The student will matriculate with all privileges and benefits available to students enrolled at UNC Pembroke including financial aid, student government leadership, academic transfer honors, and social organizations.
- 7. Teacher Outreach Program: Teachers would allow the student to student-teach back in Whiteville City Schools. The student will register for Clinical Practice in Whiteville City Schools and complete the student teaching semester in Whiteville City Schools.
- 8. Each party will notify the other party of any changes in the contacts. Contacts for each institution for the purposes of executing this agreement are:

# UNCP Pathway for Teacher Education Associate of Arts or Associate of Science

Students would complete the 60-61 hour program at the community college and transfer into UNCP prepared to enter the Educator Preparation Program (EPP).

## **General Education (45 SHC)**
